### Nehemiah Network Provides Support for 'Change Leader' Pastors

The goal of the Nehemiah Leadership Network is to help churches move and adapt to a rapidly-changing world by equipping pastors to be more effective "change leaders" in their congregations.

The three-year group mentoring experience helps pastors deepen their self-understanding, develop new skills for leadership, increase emotional intelligence, and find healthy life-balance.

Participants create and implement an individualized learning plan, meet regularly with a mentored colleague group, and attend an annual conference learning event.

Thanks to a grant written by IN/KY staff, IN/KY and GI pastors are benefiting from this program. Three groups of three to four pastors each, meet with a mentoring pastor.

David Brown, Interim Pastor at Rushville BC is one of the small group facilitators, mentoring three younger pastors in the northern Indianapolis area.

"You take on three or four pastors who are willing to undergo some personal growth and some goals for growth within their congregation and to be held accountable," he said.

Each group meets about four times per year, in addition to the annual conference. "They create ministry goals for themselves that they would like to attain, it may be personal, it may be for their church," Brown said. "My job is to

kind of go over those goals when we meet, see how they are doing and how we can encourage them. Does this goal still make sense, or do we need to tweak it, or change it or dump it all together and find something different?"

Brown said his mentoring style is affirmation and encouragement. "When we hear the word mentoring, we sometimes think this person is a critic of these people, but that's not my style," he said. "I think people do much better when you tell them what they did well."

Brown said the Pastor's life can be "a lonely task". "You need somebody you can debrief with, someone you can trust, so confidentiality is a part of this thing, we talk about that right up front," he said. "We'll try to build some level of trust in the first year where they feel comfortable sharing with each other and with me. I'm going to enjoy the process. I'm a Barnabas. I'm an encourager."

Each year, 45 to 50 people meet at the national conference and focus on a different ministry emphasis. This year the emphasis was on personal spiritual formation. Presenters challenged pastors to consider things like ways to find spiritual direction and making sure

their personal spiritual life is growing and vibrant.

Tim Earle, Pastor at Denver FBC, said the element of personal spiritual growth can be important for pastors who sometimes feel lonely and isolated, especially when they serve in rural areas. "If you're not intentional about it, it can happen," he said.

Colleague groups provide a powerful experience of mutual support and trust. "That was one of the areas of emphasis this year," he said. "Making sure we keep our relationship with God fresh, because if we don't do that, then, how are we going to teach anyone else?"

"The ministry has to be from an outflow, not from an empty tank," he said. "One of the good things about it is that you get connected with different peers from different parts of the country," Earle said. "You get to see some different viewpoints."

"Even within our own region, there are four or five of us in each group, and you get to network and learn and support each other from different parts of the state. I've met a lot of good

## Churches Encounter Communities Through Expanding Mission Grants

Financial seeds planted through the 2015 Expanding Mission grants are producing fruit in churches around the Region which received grants ranging from \$300 to \$1,000.

Among seven other recipients, the Expanding Mission funds helped to support successful outreach programs by Hope BC and Westport BC, and a tutoring initiative at FBC Young America.

The Golden Link Sunday School Class of Westport Baptist Church used their “Expanding Mission” grant to provide outreach services and meals to the surrounding community.

Their goal was to make connections with families in the community, so people knew the church was there to help meet their physical needs as well as their spiritual needs.

“We wanted to develop relationships with the un-churched families in the community and help them get to know us, so that if they came to church, they would feel comfortable and welcome,” said Deanna McCullough.

During a very successful summer barbecue, members of the class walked several blocks around the church, knocking on doors and inviting people to come to the barbecue.



“Doing that right before the typical dinnertime was actually pretty successful and people seemed to enjoy the impromptu invitation,” she said.

People with large families of children, as well as senior citizens with limited funds, especially seemed to benefit.

This led to the realization the class needed to focus their efforts on the elderly population for two reasons.

Many of the elderly live alone and are as hungry for someone to fellowship with as they are for a meal. They enjoyed sitting in the air conditioned

building, having someone to chat with, and someone to wait on them and show kindness and love.

These experiences made church members “feel like we were the hands and feet of Christ.”

Near year’s end, the group hosted a “Breakfast with Santa” which became the highlight of the year’s events for everyone. They served a free breakfast, provided kids the opportunity to sit on Santa’s lap and have a picture taken, and visit with Mrs. Claus.

Also, they gave out information about all the upcoming events for the Christmas season. It included the young people’s community outreach project, “Journey to Bethlehem”, an interactive nativity experience with stations for each part of the Christmas story, a live nativity, and supper served by the class with grant funds.

There was a great turnout from the community and they plan to make this an annual event.

“We did have some families that attended worship as a result of our outreach meals, but more than that, the reward was in feeding children and adults who we knew were often going to bed hungry,” said McCullough. “It was rewarding to see their smiles and the appreciation that they felt for such a simple act of service on our part.

“It was great for our class of senior adults to feel that we were impacting the community in a positive way and that ministry continues into the senior adult years. We found that we each had a lot of love to lavish on others, in meeting both physical and emotional needs.”

Westport’s Golden Link Class plans to continue these efforts in the coming year.

“We have been blessed to be a blessing to others and we want to thank the ABC-IN/KY for providing helpful funding for our efforts to impact the community of Westport,” McCullough said.

**‘Cuts and Soles’ helps students get ready for school.**

In Hope, the church participated in “Cuts and Soles”, a community-wide service project to help local students get ready for school.

In August 2015, they handed out

105 backpacks, 101 shoe cards, and gave 19 haircuts.

The community comes together with the United Way, which supplies names of students, who receive backpacks full of school supplies.



The “cuts” part provides free haircuts. A local salon and individual hairdressers come together and donate their time and talents.

The “soles” part of the event gives students \$20 gift cards, which they can take to Payless Shoe Stores for the purchase of new shoes.

Along with the 101 shoe cards given out, the group also placed nine extra shoe cards in the elementary school for kids that might need them throughout the year.

As of December 2015, about 90 percent of shoe cards have been redeemed for shoes.

“We are thankful for not only the grant money we received, but also, the money and support we have from the community,” said a church representative.

FBC Young America received an Expanding Missions grant with the intention of putting together a tutoring program through the church, but they found that God had a bit different program for them.

When they discovered that a larger church about seven miles away was already providing a larger after-school ministry, they did some further investigation with the local school system.

“We found out that there was a specific need in our immediate area for one-on-one tutoring,” a church spokesman said.

The church is blessed with a number of retired teachers among the membership, including retired teacher Donna Downham, who has a knack for making a close and trusted relationship with kids that do not ordinarily connect with teachers.

By helping children on a one-on-one basis to bring up their grades, their confidence and desire to do better, she has already made a difference in the lives of children in the area.



With three other retired teachers, the church hopes to grow the tutoring program.

“Our motto here at First Baptist over the past seven years has been ‘To be the heart and hands of Jesus Christ’, not only portraying the loving heart of Christ and His grace, but getting our hands dirty in doing so.”

Grant funds were used to purchase needed supplies and learning aids to help students in “hands on” training.

The program has made a connection with the school system and its administration, helping them identify children with a special need for one-on-one help.

“The biggest question we have received from parents is ‘Why are you doing this and how come it doesn’t cost us anything?’” a church spokesman said.

The church wants people to understand they aren’t really looking for something in return, but are taking it as their mission for the good of the students who need the help.

Expanding Mission Church Grants are funded through a board designation of 10% of the Region Offering. Applications are available in the fall and grants are awarded in January by the IN/KY board.

people. The material is good, and they always bring in good people to do the presentations and the things are relevant to what we're doing today. You get to stay current with what's going on."

The program has helped in looking at strategies for his church, vision, and also personal goals.

Earle said one of his personal ministry goals in the program has been to tackle his aversion to talking about money. "I have always shied away from talking about money," he said. "That was one of the topics of the conference last year, generosity, how we talk about money in a way that's Biblical. The Bible talks about our attitude towards money probably more than anything else. So, that showed me that I had a deficiency

in my ministry that I needed to look at. How do I speak of stewardship and generosity in a way that it's a lifestyle instead of just, 'Hey, here's our stewardship campaign' and be done with it?"

Diana Thompson, Pastor at South Bend FBC, came to the program for professional support.

"One of the reasons I was drawn to Nehemiah was hoping that it would provide some of that colleague and camaraderie and support kind of thing," she said. She came to the Indiana Kentucky Region last year from an ABC church in Michigan, which she said has a really strong pastoral support system in place. She found the annual conference helpful. "I don't know that I

learned a whole lot, but I was reminded of some things," she said. "That's always a good thing, right?" Because we get busy in our ministry and our lives and some of those personal spiritual care things we kind of let slide. So, it's good to be reminded, you know, you really need to be focusing on taking care of yourself."

She said she also recalled useful information on the topic of congregational life cycles. "Again, I had heard some of that before, but it was good to be reminded," she said. "In fact, I've just presented it to my leadership team, and when I went over it, it was like light bulbs went off for them. So, that's been really helpful."

One of her personal goals was to get

a personal spiritual director, and she has now located and begun working with one.

"Again, keeping me healthy so that I can be a healthy leader in the congregation," she said.

"Overall, it's great, and I'm really looking forward to being a part of it in the next few years," she said.

Started in 2002 as a ministry of American Baptist Churches USA partners, the Nehemiah Leadership Network has graduated over 100 pastors since 2005, enriching and empowering their pastoral ministry.

## Greencastle FBC Connects to Community Through the 'Giving Garden'

A chance conversation that blossomed into action has led to a strong community connection at Greencastle FBC through their "Giving Garden".

"It all started from a random conversation during coffee hour between service and Sunday School," said garden director Heidi Menzel. "The music director came up to me and said she wished we had a community garden, because we had so much land around the church."

"I said, 'We have the perfect location, because we're right on a walking path that goes throughout the whole city, and also, directly across from public housing,'" Menzel recalled.

"Everybody walks by our church in the evenings. The trail is extremely popular in our town, and the people who need the vegetables the most are directly across the street."



The pair quickly brainstormed how they could pull it off in the 15 -20 minute break, went to the pastor, who immediately agreed, and took it to the trustees right away. They said "sure", and he went out and marked it off the next day, and one of the trustees tilled up a 60 by 60 foot plot. The size of the garden has expanded each year.

"Each year, we learned from our mistakes," Menzel said. "The first year, it was kind of a messy garden, but it was a beautiful garden. We planted some things way too close. The corn got blown over by some nasty storms that

year, and the butternut squash tackled it. We probably only got a dozen ears of corn that year, but there was plenty of butternut squash! The tomatoes got blighted and were nasty, but there were several things that came out alright."

"We didn't get it planted until late June. So, a lot of the naysayers were just like, "You don't know anything about gardening if you are starting this late." But the garden ministry thrived on the interactions between the church and the community.

"It was so much fun to hear the stories from what we call 'the pickers'," she said. "You had teenagers who were desperate for fresh vegetables, but had no idea what was ripe and when. We were having to educate them as they came through. Or hearing from the folks who live in public housing; there is one lady who came over every night to pick for her neighbors who weren't physically capable of getting out. Or meeting a lady who talked about how much she had missed being in a garden. "Just to get my fingers in the dirt and to weed and feel the soil between my toes and to share this with my children; you have no idea how wonderful that's been."

"That was really fun and fulfilling", Menzel said. "That is why we started that garden, to share with the community."

There is a core group of a dozen or so volunteers who meet each Wednesday evening to work in the garden. "We have set things we need to get done, and we get them done, but it's also social hour," she said. "Everyone just enjoys themselves, chats, hangs out. There are always one or two ladies that end up just working for three hours, because they're just into what they're working on."

"On planting day last year, we had 24 people. What had taken seven or eight hours the first year, took us two or three hours because so many people showed up."



The group has been meeting once a month through the winter to lay out plans and figure out needs.

The greatest and most unexpected impact has been on the church itself. "It has truly lit a fire in the whole church," Menzel said. "Talk about planting a seed. People started wanting to try new things, to try more outreach and everything. Now people are realizing that this is the way to go. 'This is our mission. It's not just an outreach.' Our church is really starting to seek more ways to reach out to the whole community." It has definitely become the direction we are heading now."

She said the garden committee just keeps building and learning. They are blessed that a new member of the garden committee has a PhD in agronomy. "So he's an expert who can help us fill in the blanks when we're confused," she said. "God has blessed us with his help right now."

Menzel said the guiding Bible verse for the whole project has been Jeremiah 29:5&7: "Build houses and settle down. Plant gardens and eat what they produce. Work to see that the city where I sent you enjoys peace and prosperity. Pray to the Lord for it, because as it prospers you will prosper."

### Medical Mission to Haiti a Life-Changing Experience

Words cannot describe the blessings I received from God by being a medical team member on the trip to Gandou, Haiti in June 2015.

I went to Haiti as a nurse with team members from St. Anthony Padua Parish in Morris, IN. hoping to be of some help to the people there, and hopefully to make a difference in their lives in some way. I came away with the same thing from them. They made a difference in my life.

We are all God's children, and even though I was the only Baptist present, I felt so welcomed as a part of this wonderful mission family.

I saw first-hand how illness can cause devastation to a family. Unfortunately, many times it could have been prevented, if the people could have gotten the medical attention they needed.

I also saw the unbelievable strength these people have. Many would walk for hours, hoping to be seen at the clinic. Some people had to be carried or transported by mule, if they were lucky enough to have one.

I was given the opportunity to follow an elderly woman to her home, walking on very steep dangerous terrain. She was almost blind, but she could walk it with no problem, while I needed to stop several times.

Once we arrived at her home, made of sticks, rusty metal, and dried grass, I observed a twin sized bed with a mattress made of corn stalks. Her bed actually helped to hold the walls up.

On another occasion, I met a widowed mother with five children. Through the help of this mission, she is receiving \$36 every six months through the Poor Family fund. The mother is very ill, but with the help of the Mission, she is receiving the medical care needed at a hospital.



The thing that amazed me most was the faith the people of Gandou, Haiti have in our Lord.

People will walk over 2 hours in the dark to get to church on Sunday morning. Their whole life is built around church and family. The church is the center of education for their children and for their spiritual worship-for everything. I have never experienced a worship service as I did the Sunday I was there.

Their faith is tested every day. It is so hard to make sense of the suffering there. Their trust in God is far beyond anything I have ever witnessed.

These people have no electricity, very little to no food, and no clean water. I witnessed a small child getting a drink of dirty water out of the ditch. One member of this mission team is working very hard to get a water purification system up and running.

The people of Gandou are very hard-working people, trying to grow crops (all work is done by hand), but they have not been able to produce anything for the past several years.

This experience has changed my life. I will no longer take all the luxuries I have for granted. My eyes have been opened to see such suffering, and I plan to continue giving help.

### Plainfield Pennies Help Family Promise Program

A pastor in a small rural ABC church told of a church member who approached him, asking to speak with him privately.
