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About Your Instructor

Bruce Cochran served as the senior pastor at First Baptist Church in Seymour, Indiana for twenty-two years. He previously served at First Baptist Church in Pomona, CA, Clarklake Community Church (Clarklake, MI) and Long Run Baptist Church (Vevay, IN).

He holds a B.S. degree from Liberty University (1980), an MDiv from Southern Baptist Theological Seminary (1983), a ThM from Fuller Theological Seminary (1993) and a Dmin from Carolina Graduate School of Divinity (2016).

Bruce currently serves on staff with American Baptist Churches of Indiana and Kentucky as a Resource Minister working with church leaders and pastors with the primary focus of equipping leaders, empowering churches and expanding mission.

He is an USAF veteran. He has a wide variety of extracurricular interests having secured an amateur radio license and instrument rating as a private pilot. Presently, he enjoys motorcycling, bird watching and hunting. He is married and has two sons and four grandchildren.

Description and Purpose of this Class

The primary goal of this class experience is for participants to acquire and develop skills necessary to understand the Bible at a deeper level. “Introduction to the New Testament” will introduce students to the history, Jewish and Hellenistic background, language, literature, and theology of the twenty-seven books known to Christians as The New Testament. This class provides a beginning understanding of the New Testament story as well as a basic grasp of the contents, setting, and occasion of these twenty-seven books. It will be taught from a perspective that affirms the divine inspiration of the writers in their own time period and the spiritual illumination of the reader (student) today.

Class Objectives

After completing this learning experience, students should be able to do the following:

- List the twenty-seven NT books in canonical order and give a brief summary statement of the theme of each book.
- List the twenty-seven NT books in the approximate order of their writing.
- Gain an appreciation for the Intertestamental period, and how it fits into the overall development of the Kingdom of God.
- Identify the types of literature found in the NT (e.g., parable, gospel, letter, hymn).
- Distinguish a Jewish or a Hellenistic background for a NT book or section.
- Locate on a map seven early churches (e.g., Antioch, Ephesus, Thyatira)
- Discuss the primary theological themes found in the NT (e.g., kingdom of God, righteousness, salvation, eschatology).
- Understand and use parallel gospel accounts.

Required Texts

1. David & Pat Alexander, eds., Zondervan Handbook to the Bible, 4th ed. (Grand Rapids, Michigan: Zondervan Publishing House, 2011) ISBN 0-310-23095-0, hardback. (Can be purchased new or used at Amazon.com, but Cokebury’s price is very good. Available in a sturdy paperback at \$19.95 list price). This book is challenging and comprehensive, easy to read, faith-based, filled with color pictures, maps, and charts, and serves as a ready reference. **Note:** *You may use the 1999-3rd Edition David & Pat Alexander, eds., Zondervan Handbook to the Bible, 3rd ed. (Grand Rapids, Michigan: Zondervan Publishing House, 1999) ISBN 0-310-23095-0, hardback.*
2. Burton H. Throckmorton, Jr., Gospel Parallels, 5th ed. (1992: NRSV text, ISBN 0840774842) or 4th ed. (1979: RSV text, ISBN 0840751508), or any earlier edition, (Thomas Nelson). Both are available on Amazon, used, very cheap
3. An English translation of the New Testament, preferably a modern translation. (Revised Standard Version, New International Version, Good News Bible, and New King James Version are good examples.) Using a modern translation will make your reading easier and faster. The Message, however, is not a good text to use because it is a paraphrase.

Student Expectations

1. Attend all sessions whenever possible
2. Contact the instructor in advance, if you will be absent

5. Support and encourage other students in the class
6. Communicate with the instructor, if you have any questions or concerns

Requirements for earning credit for the class

1. Complete assigned readings in Zondervan Handbook to the Bible (ZHB) prior to the assigned class meeting. Gospel Parallels will be used in class.
2. Read the suggested scripture passages for each class session.
3. Participation in class discussions and exercises.
4. Attend at least 15 of the 20 hours of classroom time
5. If absent one class session, earn an excused absence by doing the following:
 - a. contact the instructor about your absence (preferably before the absence, but at least within 72 hours of the absence)
 - b. obtain notes from two students who did participate in any class session you missed
 - c. request a copy of the PowerPoint presentation(s) for the class session you missed in note format (3 slides per page); of course, this only applies if the instructor uses PowerPoint in the class session you missed.
 - d. complete a special assignment given by your instructor in addition to regular assignments; this is usually an enriching experience that will most likely pertain to the class session the student missed in some way.
