OCTOBER 2022 BIENNIAL GATHERING PARTICIPANTS CELEBRATE BEING TOGETHER



It was a great joy to be together during the October 7-8, 2022, ABC-IN/KY Biennial Gathering at Terre Haute FBC! Following the theme "Pentecost NOW" and the biblical texts of Acts 1 & 2, approximately 140 pastors and laypersons of our Region churches from multiple cultures and ethnicities (some bringing greetings or leading aspects of the weekend's worship in languages other than English) mirrored the diversity of the Church of Acts throughout the weekend while demonstrating what it truly means to be in unity with the Holy Spirit and one another.

Diversity & Unity: How Do We Share and Live Out Christ's Message?

Rev. Steve Allen, Region Minister, reminded us that to be in that unity was both "miraculous and efficient" as he reflected on the conversions of Jews and Gentiles numbering "in the tens of thousands" during the Apostles' early days of spreading

the message of Jesus' sacrifice "so that all people could be forgiven." Pastor Allen challenged 2022 Biennial participants to think about the gaps that exist between us and others who know Christ and to reflect on how we share the message of Christ with others who don't know Him.

A Woven Tapestry: Space for All at the Table

Josiah Black, pastor of Peru FBC, preached Saturday about that same unity emphasizing it was "unity the world had never seen before." Pastor Black acknowledged unity "has not come cheaply" in our history; it has sometimes come "with tears and anger."

He reminded us that in a time when division is popular, when the impulse is to "push out and to put up walls" versus coming together --or staying together-- at the table as Christ encourages us to do, we need to remember that the church doesn't belong to one culture. We are to be in "real unity" with one another. Our work is not to be "a melting pot." We are not to lose our identity. Our identity is not to be "distilled down-- with no uniqueness left."

We are called to be "a woven tapestry" in order that we might become "a picture of Jesus" once we have "done the work of The Weaver (Christ)" and created space for others. Josiah challenged attendees to go back to our respective churches and take a good long look at what it means to do the work and to create that "tapestry."

Region Biennial recap continuing from p. 1

Ministry Together Generationally Creates Belonging

The weekend gave attendees time to worship God, enjoy fellowship and learn from one another. Comparisons and contrasts in ministry generationally were discussed citing specific examples from throughout the decades. Rev. Dr. Dan Cash, then still sr. pastor at Columbus FBC, formerly part of our ABC-IN/KY staff, and recently called to be Executive Minister of the ABC of the Dakotas, pointed out, "The church is one of the few places that brings generations together. Society likes to emphasize differences while the church asks us to live together generationally."

Topics such as ministry with youth, young adults, older adults, the grieving and dying, people from urban settings and bedroom communities, and those with "an edifice complex" (defined by or confined by their church buildings) were reviewed by Rev. Dr. Bill Griffith, retired pastor/chaplain and author, who spoke from his experiences. He reminded us that ministry is often specific to a local church and culture, and that's important.

Mikayla Myers, the youngest presenter of the weekend and a sophomore at Grace College, shared her thoughts that "the church has to become expansive in its approach" and challenged congregations to open their doors, expand and grow, and to be sure to do ministry outside of the church. She reminded us that people today will not likely turn to the church; the church has to go to them.



Lack of Engagement and Adaptation –or Being Judgmental Can Cause Departures



Mikayla said that some of her friends who have stopped going to church have found it "too restrictive, too many rules. They feel like they're being judged and don't belong. Where they feel a sense of belonging, they will stick," and she further shared about her generation, saying, "...we want engagement. If not engaging us, we'll move on to somewhere else."

Dan Cash expanded those thoughts emphasizing that ministry is about building relationships and sharing Jesus with one another. "Tools such as worship, prayer, [etc.], don't change, but the methods change. And our context changes. We as leaders change as well, and I see the need to adapt."

Timely concerns such as struggles with pastoral authority, pastoral mental health, and pastoral loneliness were mentioned by other presenters. Also highlighted were necessities such as evolving worship technologies, supporting new church planting and being lifelong learners.

In the session, "Rediscovering Your Purpose in Today's Mission Field," staff from Mt. Pisgah BC in Shelbyville talked about their congregation's assimilation, discipleship and community outreach efforts in a rural setting, everything from needing to offer childcare to practicing biblical ecclesiology.

If We No Longer Existed, Would Our Community Miss Us?

Pastors Seth and Lauren Alexander of Bicknell FBC talked about their church's new definition and approach to "revival," sharing that their congregation has had to ask the poignant question, "Would our community miss us if our church no longer existed?" The Alexanders are from an area where drug addiction and poverty deeply impact local families. Therefore, their church has uncovered the need to start clothes-for-kids drives, they've championed foster care (the Alexanders put fostering children into practice in their own home in fact), and other nearby churches now collect school supplies for children of their North Knox School District.

Rev. Dr. Jeremy Myers, lead pastor of Seymour FBC, brought to light how his Southern Indiana congregation has offered various kinds of ministries for displaced persons whether during WWII or during the more recent reconstruction of several different local school buildings. They also now host, support, share meals and worship with adults celebrating recovery. These were but a few of the examples shared about how we might keep ministry relevant to the needs existing beyond our church buildings.

EXPANDING MISSION

WEST MAPLE BC HOMELESS MINISTRY CONTINUES TO EXPAND

West Maple BC (Jeffersonville, IN) and Jesus Cares at Exit 0 (off I-65), a faith-based outreach organization, began a partnership eight years ago. The church opened its doors to Exit 0 to use its facilities as a permanent locale for homeless ministry.



Funded by a local grant, the church updated its facilities— kitchen, fellowship hall, bathrooms, and converted a classroom into two showers with changing areas and two nearby stackable washer and dryers. The church can now serve as a warming station in winter, cooling station in summer, and provide emergency shelter when needed.



In 2022, Exit 0's ministry has grown to include the following (also staffed by volunteers of other churches): Sunday afternoon worship service/meal; a Wednesday evening for showers, laundry, meal and supplies; and a Friday Bible study/

meal. About 200 persons are served weekly with the goal of assisting them with case management and transitioning into housing.

Close to 350 neighborhood children participated in the church's annual Trunk or Treat providing a point of interaction with families. The 45th annual chili supper and craft auction was a fun evening of enjoying a chili "pour-in" and bidding on crafts and baked goods. Nearly \$1,500 was raised for local, state, national and international mission projects.

Just two days after the auction, packing week for Operation Christmas Child Shoebox Ministry began. The packing week was six days, but preparing to pack the boxes is a yearlong effort. This year's total of 1,271 boxes was 69 more than last year! Each box represents a child whose life will be touched with a box of gifts and the story of God's love for them.

KENTUCKY RELIEF EFFORTS CONTINUE

ABC-IN/KY congregations collected winter coats as part of ongoing efforts to support Hazard, KY residents following July 2022 flooding there. Forty women, men and children will be warmer this winter because of the coats kindly donated and delivered on November 14.

This fall, a group of Coffee Creek Association (CCA) women had sewn throws, quilts, afghans, pot holders and other items, which were taken to Bremen, KY a week later to support western KY residents following tornadoes there in December 2021. "Sewing Seeds of Love," the name of the ladies' group, resumes meeting in January to make similar items for Hazard residents (in eastern KY) to be delivered in June.

The 2023 Mission trip to Bremen will be March 26-29. Registration opens in early 2023. The Hazard trip will occur June 21-24. Please mark your calendars and plan to join these efforts!

We Are Commissioned: The Meaning of "Co-Mission"



Rev. Mark Thompson was celebrated as our Region Executive Minister on the Friday evening of the Biennial, Oct. 7, 2022. During his installation, John Campbell, pastor of Terre Haute FBC (the Biennial host church) and our newly elected Region president, proclaimed, "Jesus comes into the mess that is our world often times, and He brings all of that work and all of God's movement into focus... we find ourselves still in the midst of that same movement, still swept up in the current and flow of what God is doing."

In closing the weekend, Mark inspired us to remember that a long time ago our churches said we cannot do this [God's work] by ourselves. We can only do this if we work together. Mark encouraged IN/KY churches to let God speak to us and to listen intently. "Yours is a church and world that needs you at your best." He urged us to turn to one another, to our Brothers and Sisters in Christ here in our Region, also to the Region staff, and to not go it alone. We need to remember, "God sent them out in pairs."
